

## PREVIEWS BY "PROFILE"

Clifford Odets as director of **NONE BUT THE LONELY HEART** has made an excellent moving drama from a Richard Llewellyn's book. The story concerns itself with the attempts of Ernie Mott (Cary Grant) to overcome his environment of the London slums, and of his "Ma" (Ethel Barrymore) to save him from disaster. He is a no good from way back as the story opens. He almost proves it by becoming involved with a gang of chizzlers headed by George Coulouris. In the gang is the sultry Ada (Jane Duprez) who becomes the attraction of Ernie's life temporarily. Ernie's "ma" is played with Academy Award finesse by Ethel Barrymore. "Ma" loves her son as only a mother could, and becomes a "fence" for stolen goods in order to keep Ernie financially balanced. Ernie loves his mother deeply, but seems only to bring her unhappiness and prison in her old age.

Another Academy Award winner, Barry Fitzgerald, is a highlight in a minor role. Jane Wyatt turns in an excellent performance as Ernie's real love, while La Duprez is sultry as the blonde charmer. See this film for good adult entertainment.

The last time we saw Judy Canova in a movie was way back in 1942. She's back again in **LOUISIANA HAYRIDE**. We'll probably miss this little number unless the corn ration in the mess hall is drastically reduced.
