CHAPLAINS' CMAT

The closing lines to John Magee-s sonnet, "Sunward I've Climbed" are both beautiful and profound: "With silent, lifted mind I've trod The high untrespassed sanctity of space.

Put out my hand and touched the face of God "

When flying on happier days, all of us have had that experience. For suspended in space we have seen the world from a new perspective and felt stir within us a response to eternity. In a moment of time we became aware of an affinity between ourselves and the creative spirit of the universe. Even so have generations of sensitive men found a kinship with God when they sought Him midst places of transcendent beauty. But as Dr. Rufus Jones points out in his soul-searching book, "The Radiant Life, " being aware of God " isn't done by flying or climbing, or going somewhere. It is done by opening the doors of your life to the Beyond that is within." "Peak in Darien"

Although men must spend most of their days in the lowlands of life, everyone at some time or other has. like Cortez, "stood silent upon some peak in Darien" and seen stretched out before him the vastness of a world beautiful and enchanting. Mountain-top experiences represent the heights to which the souls of men aspire when they climb sunward to that space where the deep that is within them responds to the deep we know as God.

KEEPING UP WITH THE WORLD

As the war in Europe dra s to a close it is imperative to remember that the German General Staff, on its own admission, has already begun preparations for World War III. To them, the present conflict is only a phase in the struggle of Germanic peoples for world domination. A phase that has ended unfortunately to be sure; but the result need not be catastrophic for the Herrenfolk.

For many months now, German political and military leaders have been analysing the reasons for the defeat being administered to them now. This analysis has been very objective and very critical, and has covered every aspect of the German war effort. Factors of morale, strategy, factics, production, both within Germany and within the States that oppose her, have been and are being considered. On the basis of this comprehensive analysis the German General Staff is to lay the groundwork for the new attempt in 1965 or 1970.

He counts on our moral isolation and knows that moral isolation leads to physical isolation. Our physical isolation is the first prerequisite to Germany's rise again as a great military power.
