AUDIENCE WITH POPE

As the climax of a hectic five days spent in Rome, Major C.J. Donovan, Gro.p American Adjutant, Major Howard A. Davis, 721st Squadron Commander, and a Red Cross Director Dave Hettleman, secured an extraordinary private audience with his Holiness, Pope Pius XII.

Mr. Hettleman explained that their meeting the Pope was a result of purely chance circumstance. They had met the former Alamogordo Air Base Chaplain, who is now Chaplain of a Wing in the Rome area and who had a special invitation to present the Pope with a contribuition made by members of his Wing. He was permitted to bring a maximum of ten officers with him, and Majors Donovan, Davis and Dave Hettleman managed to become part of the company.

"We were met inside the Vatican by the Papal Secretary, who is a Cardinal," related Hettleman, 'and were taken through the Pope's quarters. Soon, the Pope entered. He was dressed completely in white, tall, slim and ascetic looking. He certainly has an appearance of spirituality. After Chaplain Flaherty made his presentation, the Pope shook hands with all of us and asked us our home towns. He spoke perfect English in a very low voice. Before we left, he gave us all a universal blessing.'

versity. His Holiness holds an honorary degree from the University. When they left, the Papal Sccretary presented them each a picture of His Holiness and a medallion with the Pope's face inscribed on it.

Afterwards, the trio was introduced to a family of Papal nobility. the father being a Marquis, Vice Commandant and Brigadier General of the Papal Guard. He took them on a complete tour of Vatican City. probably one of the most thorough any outsider is ever permitted. They visited the historic Sistine Chapel. housing the incomparable original paintings of the masters, Michelangelo, Leonardo de Vinci, Bernini. Rembrandt and Rafeal. They were allowed to see the famous Rafael collection, which is generally not open to the public. They were also shown the private collection of the Papacy. "I won't attempt to describe in words the magnificence of it all," said Hettleman, "The Swiss guards are very colorful, too," he went on, "They wear costumes designed by Michelangelo himself."

On the way to the Eternal City, Major Donovan, Major Davis and Hettleman passed throught the ru ins of Cassino, "Nothing at all stands in what once was the city," Hettleman declared, "There aren't more than two or three connected walls, But the monastery on top of the hill overlooking the place, is three fourthes intact,"
