Kennedy Asks For Red Cross Donations

...rough, rough!!

We are reproducing in part a letter received from the Field Director of the American Red Cross, George B. Kennedy:

"The 1945 Red Cross War Fund Drive is now being held-back in the States and here in Italy. It is hoped that G. I.s, from Colonels to Privates, will do their share in contributing, depending on their financial health and their generosity.

"No formal drive will be staged on the base, but officers will be designated in each Squadron and Headquarters to whom donations may be made. Those desirous of obtaining membership cards may obtain one on the payment of the annual membership fee of one dollar. It is expected that pay-day will find a goodly number of G. I. s on the Red Cross rolls, although no quota has been set.

"Any G. I. in Italy for more than a week or so has become acquainted with the Red Cross Clubs where coffee and doughnuts have always provided a much-welcome stimulus, and where the writing and game rooms and entertainment have always been an appreciated recreational feature.

"Day to day services of the Red Cross are too many and diverse to mention. Blood Banks have been the principal source of supply for plasma for wounded G. I.s in all combat theatres. Of outstanding service too, are the Food and Medical packages sent by the Red Cross to POWs, which many returnees have credited with being life-saving factors."
